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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Update on Strategic Projects at Caulfield Grammar School



The School Executive are delighted to report to our community on the progress of our Strategic Projects. We are thrilled most projects from the last 4 years are now completed and operational in the school. This has been a significant load on the staff as we have continued to focus our attention on the academic program in particular and on improving opportunities to allow learning to be at ever higher standards.

The information provided below gives a brief update on each of the projects. In addition to these projects there will be updates on Capital Works as approvals from our own council and local Council authorities are received.

Quality Learning

Visible Wellbeing - On track with launch of Visible Wellbeing on 09/10/17

• This is the 6th element of the Teaching and Learning portfolio and we are one of 12 schools nationally working with Professor Lea Waters to imbed wellbeing in our culture and classroom practice. Supporting students with their own wellbeing is critical to achievement through school and later life.

FOCUS and teacher professional learning - Completed and operational

• FOCUS is an acronym for Feedback, Ownership, Collaboration, Understanding and Specific (learning intentions). These are the 5 key elements we expect from teachers in how they work with students in the classroom. This and other weekly professional development of the staff is critical in ensuring improvement to student learning.

Learning Management System - Completed and operational – for staff and students; On track – for parents in early 2018

• The Learning management system (our name is AccessCGS) makes assignments, information and feedback readily available to students at any time. This major review is completed and operating for students in 2017. We are on track to open elements of this system to parents to

provide feedback on student learning in early 2018.

Written Curriculum (Curriculum Unit Planning System - CUPS) - **Completed and** operational

 We have developed an on-line tool for staff that links to the Australian Curriculum. This is now fully operational for Caulfield Grammar staff ensuring our high quality learning programs are aligned to the Australian curriculum.

Middle School Review - Completed

• This comprehensive review of the curriculum in our Middle Schools has been completed and was the catalyst for a decision by our Learning Area Leaders to recommend the adoption of the International Baccalaureate (IB) Middle Years Program (MYP) to our School Executive and Council. The adoption of the IB MYP will drive consistency across all areas of the Middle School, and demonstrates our desire to constantly reflect on, and improve, the learning of students. We believe this will enhance the preparation of our students for VCE study.

Yarra Junction - 3rd Generation - Delayed

• This was delayed due to the introduction of the MYP. We wanted to align the work of YJ with that of the Melbourne campuses and so this will be actioned at a later stage.

Quality Employees

National Emerging Leaders Program - Completed and operational

 This program works in conjunction with Barker College Sydney and AIS Leadership Centre. This program engages five middle managers and is a 12-month leadership training course. We have had ten staff participate in this program to date and many have progressed into higher levels of leadership.

Employee Value Proposition - Completed and operational

 Student learning is highly dependent on the quality of staff at Caulfield Grammar.
 The Employee Value Proposition (EVP) captures the mechanism now in place to be positioned as an 'employer of choice', and to attract the best staff.

Quality Community

Child and Youth Safety Strategy - On track

• Student safety and welfare is our key



concern. Recent changes to Victorian legislation have put some additional requirements on schools to continue to ensure safety for students. The school is on track to deliver these improvements.

Community Satisfaction and Perception Survey - Completed and details ready for next Strategic Plan

• The MMG survey results have highlighted the strong place Caulfield Grammar has within our community and highlighted some issues for us to attend to. These issues will go forward for the Executive and Council for consideration in 2018 and beyond.

Review of Marketing and Communication Strategy - On track for completion in mid 2018

 This branding refresh for the school has begun with an anticipated completion in 2018

Fundraising - Completed and operational

• The work of the Caulfield Grammar School Foundation has been considered and the position of Director of Advancement has been filled with the appointment of Mr Andrew Cole. Mr Cole will work with the Foundation and members of our community to support fundraising initiatives for new buildings, scholarship and bursary programs and our bequest program, to ensure the financial strength of the school into the future.

Quality Resourcing

Establishment of PMO - Completed and operational

 The school has many programs of change underway and the project office has been created to support these changes in a systematic way.

P3 Project - On track with expected completion of review stage in late 2017

 We believe this project is the first of its kind in schools. It will produce a comprehensive review of the people; process and platforms operating in the school. This report is due to the council in late 2017 and will then propose a decade long change process for our systems and processes in the school.

Cloud Strategy - Completed and operational

 24/7 availability of information through cloud storage was a key advancement to support the school's commitment to a mobile technology platform. This makes information on learning constantly available to students, on and off campus, including those at the Nanjing Campus.

Risk Management Framework - On track

 The school is constantly reviewing its risk framework to ensure the school provides a safe and secure environment for all members of our community.

10 Year Master Plan - Operational

• The Council has developed a 10-year master plan for each of our Melbourne-based campuses. The Learning Projects were our experimental designs that have now, with appropriate reflection, guided the extension to the Roy Hoult Centre at Caulfield Campus, classroom refurbishment at Malvern Campus and the refurbishment of the B and C Clusters at Wheelers Hill. The Council and Executive are about to embark on a refresh of our Strategic direction and will report on our progress to the school community in 2018.

As the 2017 school year comes to a close I wish to pay tribute to the following long-serving members of staff who will leave us at the end of this year.

Reverend Laurie Barton

Reverend Laurie Barton commenced at Caulfield Grammar School as Chaplain and Head of Religious Education in April 1993. Laurie has been involved with the school as both a teacher and a parent for almost 25 years, with his three children Thomas, Richard and Annabel all being students at Wheelers Hill in both their Primary and Secondary years. As Chaplain of the Wheelers Hill Campus, Laurie has been central to the spiritual life of the students and staff and has fostered relationships with the wider community through his involvement with local church groups, the Inter-Faith Dialogue and Community Service Program at the school. Amongst his initiatives have been the relationship with the Glenallen School, a specialist school in Glen Waverley, and more recently the introduction of tutoring services for asylum seekers.

Embodying and enabling students to experience a living wholehearted Christian faith and community has always been central to Laurie's call as chaplain. This has been reflected in his leading of 'Faith Week' since 1995, the voluntary student faith groups he has overseen throughout the years, the Friends of the Chapel parent group, as well as the many baptisms, weddings, funerals and confirmations he has faithfully presided over throughout his long fruitful season at Caulfield Grammar School.

Mr Andrew Mann

Andrew commenced at Caulfield Grammar School in 1998 and during this time he has undertaken a variety of roles - teacher, sport coach and administrator.

A very early adopter of technology, Andrew embraced the Computer Algebra System (CAS). From its inception, he developed programmes that put Caulfield students ahead of others in this field. He was also instrumental in the creation and implementation of the School's reporting systems, including Mark Book and Accelerus. Since 2003 he serviced the campus reporting and student data analysis systems alongside his teaching roles. He prepared the campus reporting cycles four times a year and generated numerous analysis reports for the Campus Leadership Team and senior staff, covering, but not limited to Academic Excellence, General Excellence and Colours. He also designed and developed the Campus Comparative reports, Individual Student Academic Transcripts and Examination Timetables.

Andrew was a member of Davies House and was an Assistant Head of Davies House in Term 3 1994.

In all that Andrew did, he was committed to provide the very best learning opportunities for his students and also on the sports field in Badminton and Soccer.

Mr Greg Yarnton

Mr Yarnton has been involved with Caulfield Grammar as a teacher and parent for over 32 years. He joined the staff as a Humanities Teacher at the Wheelers Hill Campus on 15 April 1985 where he has been instrumental in the development of the Humanities Faculty. He was appointed as the Learning Area Leader, Humanities 7-9 in 2002. He has given 15 years' service as a faculty head, moving to the Head of Humanities 10-12 in the last two years.

Mr Yarnton is a passionate Geography teacher and is closely involved with the Geography Teachers Association of Victoria where he has presented at seminars and workshops.



2017 saw the expansion of the tutoring scheme for children from asylum seeker and refugee families linked to St Gerard's Primary School in Dandenong North. Learning Projects win prestigious global education design awards

Caulfield Grammar's Learning Project buildings have been awarded a prestigious global education design award. The announcement was made at an award ceremony in Atlanta, USA on 28 October.

Caulfield Grammar and Hayball, the school's architects for the project, jointly took out the top accolade for education design globally the Association for Learning Environments' James D MacConnell Award.

BOARDING: A ONCE IN A LIFETIME OPPORTUNITY

Once the window of secondary school education has passed, gone also is the opportunity of a true boarding school life experience.



So says Simone Hellier, herself the mother of a one-time boarding student, and now Co-ordinator of Ardoch Girls Boarding House.

Simone joined Caulfield's boarding community in 2017, following the retirement of long-serving staff member Jacqueline Roche. She is a firm believer in the benefits of a boarding experience. Here she reflects on her early impressions and perspectives of our residential community and how this can set a student up as a global citizen, independent and resilient, with skills that will help them through their entire life. It may have crossed your mind as to what type of sentient would beset a parent to even consider packing their darling children off to a school far from home only to co-exist with sobbing, snoring, messy, buoyant and, at times irritable house mates?

Boarding families don't choose this because they love their children any less than day schoolers, or as it is easily affordable, nor even as there may be live in 'babysitters'. In fact, it is quite the opposite. They are light in the pocket and heavy in the heart each time they say goodbye. They know that the boarding days of the 60's are gone and that an opportunity to board at Caulfield Grammar is likely to teach their child ways of the world that cannot be learnt in any other comparable situation. This is the benefit of contemporary co-educational boarding with rural Victorian students living and sharing with interstate and international boarding students.

In my role, I spend 5 nights a week staying with the girls in the boarding house, providing guidance, support and security. I liaise with parents and school staff along with all boarding house staff to ensure the boarders are flourishing.

As a parent, I spent 6 years living the highs and lows, as my son attended a boarding school from Years 7 to 12. I joined the Boarder's Parents Committee and ended up a member of the Boarding Parents Board for several years as Secretary, then Vice President. Having experienced many sides of boarding school life, I can confidently say attending boarding school IS a wonderful opportunity.

Boarding parents seem to comprehend that adolescents are 'flock' beings. I am not suggesting this is all of them, but there is a majority who prefer to be with 'their own kind.' Sure it is nice to see your kids every day, but perhaps at secondary age, they're just not that into seeing you so regularly. An environment where they have dozens of peers to gather with, from eyes open to shut is one way boarding school makes them happy. The time shared together with family becomes one the boarders really look forward to. They learn to appreciate their parent's time, and the comforts of home. They are grateful when things are done for them. Family time becomes quality time.

The superior pastoral care at Caulfield Grammar is led by the example of Tim Gallop and his family, with Darren Lowe and his family also on deck. This 'captain' and 'skipper' team provide a very unique environment where the Morcom family begins and blossoms. The culture inside Morcom House is very much one of mutual respect and understanding.

The boarders' lives are very structured. For those students who may have the propensity to become slack with their studies at home, the boarding house establishes a routine for prep times so everyone has the opportunity to get their work done. Tutoring is offered during week nights to assist with homework queries and to reinforce the days learning. This is a definite bonus that day students miss out on.

Teenagers seem to thrive when they know a structured routine. The boarders know when they need to be eating and what they will be eating. They know when they will be studying and when they can relax. Sports times, leave times, meeting times are consistent. This routine is set and becomes engrained in a way not always possible to achieve in the home environment.

Boundaries provide a secure environment where every individual can share their own customs and personality and be accepted and appreciated for their uniqueness. A most exhilarating experience is when the students from all walks of life stand side by side and with passion, sing the house song and house ditties, spurring on fellow house members in all types of events and situations. A victory for a house member is felt like a personal victory to each individually. Such is the bond in the boarding house.

There are themed dinners each term in the Boarding House. The most recent was the barn dance, complete with live band. The infectious laughter as boys and girls, entwined with teachers and supervisors, "strip the willow" contagious and heartwarming. These kids of such diverse backgrounds don't yet realise that they are growing up like brothers and sisters with future leaders, doctors, inventors, scientists and superstars of the future.

What an opportunity of a life time! Learning with, living with and loving others as they develop a lifetime of opportunities together.

NANJING - A DAY IN THE LIFE

If you asked someone to describe what a teacher does, they'd probably describe a person simply imparting knowledge, but most of us know that ideally it is more about facilitating learning, among other things.









Back in a regular day school, I sometimes felt like this had to take a back seat under the pressure of content quotas, frequent assessment tasks and reporting deadlines. Here at the Nanjing Campus of Caulfield Grammar School, we don't have academic classes but there is by no means a slower pace and there definitely is learning taking place. We are providing our students with an Internationalism Program via not just a truly experiential model, but also through an Inquiry method of learning.

A regular day for an Activity Teacher might start with the breakfast shift (unless you're the kind who has already been out for a run or bike ride). Next is a cultural activity for the students such as calligraphy, painting or language lessons. An Activity Teacher will also pose a Provocation to the Group to inspire and model curiosity. Then the Pod of about 9 students get together to talk through their plan for the day, their Pod Ops. Our main daily duty is to accompany the Pod in a passive capacity, which can be challenging at times, to truly let the students face obstacles and learn through experience. Each student has a role of responsibility for the day. They have planned ahead for all of their different roles and know that not only their success, but that of the whole Pod, relies on them putting in the effort during planning and while in the field. In this scenario, the teacher with the Pod is truly facilitating their learning rather than imparting knowledge or micro-managing their every move. Sometimes the Navigator will get us off the bus a stop too late, sometimes the Co-ordinator will let the Pod spend

some time in a lovely garden we discover, or sometimes the Finance person might not be able to account for their spending at the end of the day. It's all part of the journey to become a responsible young adult, a confident traveller, an empathetic global citizen.

The Pod will visit one or two sites a day and the Research and Learning student/s will give some information about the site and lead a learning activity. The site and learning activity are chosen by the students as a way to explore their Global Context and Inquiry Statement, and to progress towards answering their Inquiry Questions.

At the end of the afternoon the Pod will have a debrief of the day and reflect on their learning. If they need time to complete their planning for the next day then that can happen too. An Activity Teacher might then knock off or be rostered on to a combination of shifts over afternoon free time, dinner, or the evening activity and bed time.

During the Team and Individual Inquiry, the whole campus travels to Shanghai and Beijing for four days each to continue our site visits. Book-ending the two ten-day Inquiries are plenty of leisure days too, which usually contain an active component and some down time for the students. All of this and more fits nicely into five weeks. Personally, at the end of the Group I feel that I have spent meaningful time with our students, facilitated their learning in a unique setting, and also had the chance to be a tourist in China myself.







A Boarding Life... Fun and Games...

When past boarder, Max Lang (1941-46) made an impromptu visit to his old school on Glen Eira Road mid-2017, he shared many stories of boarding life with Head of Boarding, Mr Tim Gallop. He also loaned an old album filled with images of boarding life, sport and his school mates so that the Archives could copy them.

Many of the photographs were taken by Max and fellow classmates and reveal a great sense of fun, such as the 'Pyramid' of boys tumbling on the lawn, 'Boarders group, c. 1944' in the quadrangle and portraits of Max in his school uniform. During the 1940s and 1950s, many students took up photography as a hobby, and like Max, had their photographs published in the school magazine, enhancing reports on holiday activities, school camps or hobbies.

Past Student Profile: The late Allen Blackburn (1929-39) Ad astra – to the stars



Growing up between the beach and Albert Park in Cowderoy Street, St Kilda, Allen Blackburn came to Caulfield Grammar School in 1929.

By the time he reached secondary school he had already established himself as a capable sportsman. Over the next six years, he rose through the ranks of under-age teams to play 1st XI cricket in Year 10 and 11, captaining the team in Year 12. In Year 11, he also represented the school in tennis and football and in Year 12, was captain of tennis as well as cricket — no mean feat given that they are both summer sports. He was also vice-captain of the 1st XVIII and its star ruckman.

Allen was much rewarded for his sporting activities and leadership. He gained House Colours in 1937 and they were re-awarded the following year. School Colours for cricket were also awarded in 1937, re-awarded in 1938, also receiving School Colours for football.

In his final and very busy year at Caulfield, he was appointed a prefect and, with other Caulfield boys, a Somers Camp representative, assisting in the camp's programs.

On leaving school, Allen trained with the Bjelke Petersen physical education organisation and became a professional tennis coach.

In 1940, Allen joined the Royal Australian Air Force. He trained as part of the Empire Air

Training Scheme, Sergeant Pilot Blackburn was posted to No. 457 Squadron at Baginton, near Coventry in England. The squadron was equipped with Supermarine Spitfires and became part of 9 Group of Fighter Command.

Over the next seven months, the squadron escorted convoys, patrolled the seas to Britain's west, escorted bombing raids and conducted sweeps to engage enemy aircraft in the skies above occupied France and Belgium.

Ordered to return to Australia on 28th May, 1942, the squadron arrived in Melbourne on 13th August and re-assembled at Richmond RAAF Base in New South Wales on 6th September.

Just over three weeks after his return to Australia, Allen Martin Blackburn was killed in a flying accident during practice operations near Sydney. His body was returned to Melbourne and he was buried in the Brighton Cemetery. He was just twenty-two years old.

457 Squadron returned to front-line service in the defence of Darwin in January 1943. It mounted its last operation on 13 August 1945, two days before the Japanese surrender.

ULLIN – Claude George AM

The entire Caulfield Grammar School community, led by the President of Council, past and present members of Council and past and present Principals, deeply mourns the passing of Mr Claude Ullin AM, a greatly respected, admired and dedicated member of our school community.

Since graduating as a student in 1954, Claude has had

an uninterrupted period of service to Caulfield Grammar School.

Claude joined the Committee of the Caulfield Grammarians' Association in 1955 and he served as President from 1971 to 1972. He was also President of the Caulfield Grammarians Football Club from 1974 to 1977 and again from 1983 to 1984. He was elected a Fellow of the Caulfield Grammarians' Association in 1989 for his service to the Association and the school community.

Claude was the Founding Chairman of the Caulfield Grammar School Foundation, established in 1979. Under Claude's leadership the Foundation enjoyed its most successful period of fundraising.

He served on the School Council for 40 years from 1970 to 2010. Claude was made a Council Member Emeritus in 2010 and continued to take a very active interest in the school, including once again as Chairman of the Foundation Board.

His outstanding contribution to the school was recognised in 2010 when the School Council unanimously agreed to name a substantial new building at Wheelers Hill Campus, *The Ullin Centre*.

In the educational sector beyond Caulfield Grammar School, Claude previously held the position of Chairman of the Board of the Association of Independent Schools of Victoria (now Independent Schools Victoria) which accorded him recognition for his knowledge, experience and commitment to the Independent School sector in this State.

In addition to the significant contribution Claude made to Caulfield Grammar he also made extensive valuable contributions to many other organisations.

The Caulfield Grammar School community will be forever grateful to Claude who gave so generously of his professional expertise and wisdom. His passion, enthusiasm and commitment for all things Caulfield Grammar School was legendary and he will be remembered with great fondness, respect and admiration.

EVANS – John Robert

It is with immense sadness that we write of the sudden death of the immediate past President of School Council, Mr John Evans on Saturday 25 November 2017. John had become unexpectedly ill a few days earlier.

John retired from the School Council in May 2016 after more than 40 years as a member of Council

which included him serving as President from 2002 to 2016. John was made a President Emeritus and continued to take a very active interest in the school.

John was a student of Caulfield Grammar School from 1949 to 1961. Upon leaving he went on to study a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) at University of Melbourne, then graduated with a Master's degree in Law from Monash University. Law was to be his pathway.

Being active in past student activities, John took on official roles within the alumni body, the Caulfield Grammarians' Association (CGA). In 1972, he became Treasurer of the Caulfield Grammarians' Football Club, then proceeded with roles in the CGA including Secretary, Senior Vice-President then President in 1975, a position he held for two years. He then joined the School Council in an ex-officio capacity as President of the Caulfield Grammarians' Association in 1975. When he reached the end of his term he was asked to remain on the School Council and assumed the role of the school's legal adviser.

In 2009 John was awarded a CGA Fellowship for his extensive service to the school and the CGA, including as President and Senior Vice President. He was a Master and Senior Warden of the Caulfield Grammarians' Lodge. He was also a Caulfield Grammar School Foundation Trustee, a School Company Member and his involvement on School Council was extensive.

John was a major and significant contributor to the great success of Caulfield as a learning institution. The improvements to our learning environments, the growth of learning opportunities for our students and the cultural

change achieved over the period of John's involvement in School Council are outstanding and numerous. His expertise in matters of law, finance and superannuation was immense and his sound wisdom and the stability of his guiding hand, a reassuring asset.

In his final address as President of Council in December 2015, John identified the following as his highlights during his time on School Council: the establishment of the School's rowing facility on the Yarra River with the Banks Rowing Club; the establishment of Wheelers Hill Campus; the decision for the School to become co-educational at all campuses and across all year levels; the founding of Nanjing Campus and the building of the Cripps Centre at Caulfield Campus and the Memorial Hall at Wheelers Hill Campus, known as the Twin Halls Project — the School's largest fundraising project. John was Chair of the Twin Halls Appeal and this is where his experience and leadership were most greatly felt.

John's leadership, professional expertise, unwavering support, passion, commitment and dedication have been immense and greatly felt across all campuses of our school.

Rosemary and John's sons also attended the school.

John also made extensive and valuable contributions to many other organisations.

The Caulfield Grammar School community will be forever grateful to John who gave so generously of his professional expertise and wisdom. His passion, enthusiasm and commitment for all things Caulfield Grammar School were legendary and his legacy will continue now and well into the future.

John will be remembered with great fondness, respect and admiration and Caulfield Grammar School gives very grateful thanks for his life. He will be so greatly missed.

Australia Day Honour -Tom Morris OAM

Congratulations to **Tom Morris** (1952-58) who received an OAM (Medal of the Order of Australia in the General Division) in the 2017 Australian Day Honours "for service to the building and construction industry". Tom was National President of the Australian Institute of Building (AIB) from 2004 to 2006 and President of the AIB's Victorian Chapter in 1999 and 2000. He is a past board member of the Master Builders' Association of Victoria and has held the position of Adjunct Professor, Property Construction and Project Management, RMIT University, since 2009.

Law and Music

It has been an interesting and varied journey for **Yvonne Kushnir** (1995-2008) who was admitted to practise as an Australian Lawyer at a ceremony at the Supreme Court on 19 September.

Yvonne graduated from Monash University in 2012 with Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce degrees while working part-time in a small physiotherapy clinic performing administrative and marketing duties; she also did some waitressing.

The law beckoned and Yvonne began at the University of Melbourne's School of Law in 2014, graduating with the degree of Juris Doctor in 2016. In 2014, she did a short internship with a criminal defence attorney in Philadelphia. The following year, she volunteered with the Prison Legal Education and Assistance Program which involved speaking to prisoners about their rights and educating them on court procedures. At the end of 2015, she undertook a summer clerkship with solicitors Herbert Smith Freehills.

Not one to stand still for long, Yvonne went on a two-week study tour to the USA in 2016, visiting international human rights and legal institutions. Her principal areas of interest are international law, human rights law and criminal defence work. On her return to Australia, she volunteered with the Flemington and Kensington Community Legal Centre in its police accountability clinic. She is continuing her work there as a volunteer lawyer.

Yvonne completed her professional legal training in July, having done her placement with solicitors Stary Norton Halphen

who handle some of the state's most serious criminal defence matters. She also undertook a two-week clerkship with Media Arts Lawyers.

But all is not law. Yvonne was School Music Captain and she has continued to play both the violin and saxophone, playing with the Melbourne Youth Jazz Orchestra, the Zelman Symphony Orchestra and now the Melbourne Lawyers' Orchestra.

Taking a year off study in 2013, Yvonne travelled extensively across Europe and the USA, visiting her family in the Ukraine and experiencing a ten-day program in Israel run by Taglit Birthright.

Indeed, it has been an interesting journey but, to be sure, there is lots more to come.

And there are more family members to come, including Stephanie's sister Sally, who commences in Year 7 next year, and Jeremy Pyman's two children, Millicent and Joshua, who will commence in 2019 and 2021, respectively.

Celebrated Sculptor

The death of **Lawrence Argent** (1971-74) on 4 October 2017 was reported widely in news media in the USA. Born in England in 1957, Lawrence grew up in Australia and studied sculpture at RMIT after completing his secondary education at Caulfield Grammar. He moved to the USA in the 1980s where he continued his studies in art and sculpture. He is particularly well known in Denver, Colorado, where his 40-foot sculpture titled "I See What You Mean", but better known as "The Big Blue Bear". peeks through the glass into the lobby of Colorado Convention Center. The Big Blue Bear is a major tourist attraction in Denver. After completing it in 2005 Lawrence undertook many other public art projects in the USA and elsewhere in the world, including China. He retired from his position as Professor, Head of Sculpture, School of Art and Art History, at the University of Denver in 2016 and was named Professor Emeritus. The university released the following statement after his death: "The University of Denver is deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Lawrence Argent. For nearly 25 years he was an awardwinning artist and faculty member in the School of Art and Art History. He was a beloved mentor to countless students and a respected colleague. His public art – installed on DU's campus and on sites around the world – will have an impact for many years to come."
